Artificial Intelligence and Security Governance in Contemporary International Affairs: Information societies, decision-making and security

Contemporary society is driven by the fast-track information revolution. **A gradual transfer of decision-making procedures and processes into digital realm fosters its efficiency and effectiveness, but also raises different security-related questions and reservations.**

Algorithms have an increasingly important role in defining main determinants of information flow and their dissemination. They influence data availability, collection, and management. Thus, a mathematical set of rules specifies the behaviour of different data groups and influences the decision-making process at different levels of societal developments, private, business, national or international. Henceforth, **the IT security, and the role of AI become vital for the debate about decision-making and security in contemporary international environment.** In the context of growing use of algorithms in the decision-making processes, that is becoming increasingly AI-based and automatic, with less and less reliance on human resources, the issue of security positions itself at the top of priority list of every serious decision-making process.

- ◆ Can AI influence the geopolitical positioning of member states and of the EU itself?
- ◆ What is the EU's perspective on AI, cyber security and/or defence?
- ◆ Is it possible to regulate the influence of AI? Where is the line between the information necessary for learning and the excessive usage of information which could lead to security and democratic threats?
- ◆ How can AI be governed in the public sector so that it can simultaneously provide efficient public services and the protection of individuals?

Sandro Knezović, PhD, senior researcher associate, IRMO

Dr. Sandro Knezović is a Senior Research Associate at the Institute for Development and International Relations in Zagreb (Croatia). He earned his academic degree in Political Science at the Faculty of Political Science, University of Zagreb. His research is concentrated on IR topics, especially those related to international and European security (CFSP/CSDP), the EU and NATO enlargement and its impact on the region of Southeast Europe. He is a member of numerous international expert and he has published a number of scientific and professional papers and books.



Aleksandra Markić Boban, Head of Project Office Zagreb, Hanns Seidel Foundation

Aleksandra Markić Boban graduated from the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University of Zagreb in English and German Language and Literature (MA), and holds a MScs in European Studies from the Faculty of Political Science of the University of Zagreb. Before joining the Hanns Seidel Foundation, Aleksandra worked for the ECMM and the EUAM as well as for the German Ambassy in Zagreb. In her capacity as the Head of Project Office in Zagreb she was responsible for initiating, organizing and evaluating more than 1,000 events dealing with politics, diplomacy, law and local self-government. Her main focus is on the European affairs, international affairs and development cooperation. Aleksandra is co-editor of the book "Public Diplomacy: Nation Branding and Image" and co-editor of the collection of papers "A Chance or a Threat? Reform of Local and Regional Self-Government in Croatia".



Karlo Ressler, PhD, Vice President of AIDA (Special Committee on Artificial Intelligence in the Digital Age), European Parliament

MEP Karlo Ressler (EPP) is the general rapporteur of the European Parliament for the EU budget 2022. He also sits in the Committee on Civil liberties, Judiciary and Home Affairs. He was Vice-President of the Special Committee on Artificial Intelligence in a Digital Age. Prior to his term in the European Parliament, he served as an advisor in the Cabinet of Prime Minister of Croatia Andrej Plenković. From 2018 to 2021, he was Vice-President of the Youth of the European People's Party (YEPP). Ressler graduated law with honours (magna cum laude) at the Faculty of Law in Zagreb. In 2022, he defended his doctoral dissertation at the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Crime, Security and Law in Freiburg.



Bernard Gršić, State Secretary in the Central State Office for the Development of the Digital Society

Bernard Gršić is State Secretary in charge of the development of the Croatian digital society, i.e., focusing on digitising public administration, economy, enhancing digital skills of citizens and promoting cybersecurity. Anke Obendiek is a postdoctoral researcher at the Centre for European Integration Research at the University of Vienna. She received her PhD from the Hertie School, Berlin, in 2020. Her book "Data Governance: Value Orders and Jurisdictional Conflicts" was published by Oxford University Press in 2022. From 2017 to 2020, she was a research associate in the DFG-funded project 'Evolving Internet Interfaces: Content Control and Privacy Protection' at the Hertie School and a research affiliate at the Berlin Graduate School for Global and Transregional Studies. Her research focuses on digital policy and data governance from a global perspective.
